Session Title	The Point	Learning Goals	Scripture
God Made Known	We can come to know something of God through the created world, especially humans. This points to a source and reality far greater than creation—our God who is present and active in our world and in our lives.	Adolescents will explore how God, the origin and source of everything, communicates something about himself and how they can be open to God's presence and action in their own lives.	Psalms 8; Wisdom 13:1-5; Sirach 17:1-9; & Romans 1:19-20
Scripture and Tradition	In Scripture and the Tradition of the Church, we see who God is and who God calls us to be. Scripture and Tradition are the source and guide for our relationship with God and others.	Youth will learn about God's Revelation in Scripture and Tradition and how both are God's word to us today. They will consider various ways to apply God's word to their lives.	Psalms 119:105; Matthew 28:20; 1 Thessalonians 2:13; 2 Timothy 3:16-17
Our Response of Faith	By faith, we respond to God and what he has made known. Faith is about being in relationship with the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, seeing things from the divine perspective.	Adolescents will consider the many layers of faith, how God's Revelation requires a personal response from us, and what impact faith in Jesus Christ has and can have in their day-to-day lives.	John 3: 31-36; John 8:12; Ephesians 1:15-20; Hebrews 11: 1; John 1:5-7
Catholic Approach to Scripture	When we proclaim Scripture in the liturgy, reflect on it with others, and pray with it, we turn to the Holy Spirit's guidance and the help of the Church to understand the message and its meaning for our lives.	Youth will increase their understanding of a Catholic interpretation of Scripture, recognize the distinguishing characteristics of Catholic exegesis, and explore the importance of studying Scripture and learning how to connect its message to their lives.	Romans 15:4; 1 Corinthians 10:1-4, 11; & Revelation 21:1-22
The Old and the New	The Old and New Testaments have an important connection that we need to recognize and appreciate; together they are essential to our understanding of Jesus and to our lives as disciples.	Youth will find out more about the relationship between the Old and New Testaments and the old and new covenants. They will come to a greater understanding of the role of Scripture in their lives as individuals and as part of a community of faith.	Luke 4:16-30, 24:25-27, 44-48
The Gospels	The Gospels are the very heart of the Scriptures; in them we meet Jesus, and learn about his life, teachings, and saving work. As Jesus' disciples, we study the Gospels and live by the Good News contained in them.	Adolescents will learn about the four Gospels and the message they contain as documents of faith, not biographies or historical timelines of Jesus' life. They will see the importance of studying the Gospels and proclaiming the Good News by the things they say and do.	Matthew 4:23-25, 13:1-9; John 20:30 and 21:24-25
